# **MEMBERS PLANT DISPLAY AT INDOOR MEETINGS**

The aim of the display is to show flowers and foliage from members' gardens. Material can be brought in on the day of the meeting and it is very helpful to have a slip of paper showing names and cultivars of the items, together with your name, in case of queries. The items can be of cut flowers or even a pot of something that you would like others to see. The display brings an extra dimension to our meetings. How many times have you thought that you could have provided something interesting? It isn't a competition and doesn't get judged or sold.

So, please, have a look around your garden and bring a part of it with you. Containers are provided but you can bring your own. Items should be collected and taken home again when you leave. It could even be something that you don't know the name of, in which case one of our knowledgeable members can probably help.

We do hope that you will want to join in and make the display spectacular every time!

# PLANT SALES AT INDOOR MEETINGS

Plants brought for the sale table should have 2 plant labels, one with plant name and cultivar, if possible, and the other label showing your name and the price required.

Plants should be well-rooted and not just recently dug up.

We are all trying to reduce our use of plastics and so would request that members bring their own bags for taking plant purchases home. Plastic bags will no longer be supplied from the plant sales table.

# TAKE THREE PLANTS

We all want to get the most from the space in our gardens, especially if we garden in a small space. Here are some ideas for plant combinations to try that will give months of colour and texture in a compact space.

### 3 Plants for a lightly shaded spot

Spring: Lamprocapnos spectabilis (formerly Dicentra)



An early-flowering herbaceous perennial with fascinating heartshaped flowers from late April – June. Attractive leaves and pink-flushed stems. Leaves die down in late summer. Height 75m.

Summer: Hakonechloa macra 'Aureola' (Japanese Forest Grass)

Deciduous grass with arching leaves striped in yellow, cream and green. Grows to 30cm and gradually spreads to form a lovely fountain clump. Leaves turn straw blonde finally in autumn and disintegrate in late winter.





The pink or white flowers emerge in early autumn and are followed by heartshaped leaves, many with silver and dark green markings. The leaves are fresh-looking all winter. It will seed around and form large corms after several years.

### <u>3 Plants for a sunny spot.</u>

Spring: Crocus and Ophiopogon planiscapus 'Nigrescens' (Black Lily Turf)

Alright, this makes 4 plants! But the golden crocus really lights up among the black lily turf. Choose yellow or white crocus and plant around the *Ophiopogon*, which is evergreen (or everblack?) and will gradually spread so that the two will merge together.





A low-growing evergreen shrub that only reaches 15cm but is lax and can make a carpet 50cm across. Prune lightly after flowering to prevent it getting woody. Other colours are available including white or yellow, some with silver leaves.

Autumn: Hesperanthera 'Mrs Hegarty'

bulb with Α narrow sword-shaped leaves in a fresh green. Flower spikes emerge during August and open to delicate-looking starry throughout flowers September and well into October. Height 45cm. This is also available in scarlet, depending on your preference.



# A HARDY SURPRISE

Many of our favourite summer flowers for tubs and pots are Fuchsias. There are also many familiar hardy forms for the garden, but here are a couple that you may not be aware of.



Fuchsia *thvmifolia* has small. serrated leaves and small. magenta-pink flowers that are not of the usual fuchsia shape. It flowers so profusely that the size of the flowers is immaterial. It will flower almost all year-round through a mild winter and if left unpruned. However, a good trim in April produces a better shape and more flowers on less woody growth.

Shady places can also be brightened up by fuchsias with golden or variegated foliage and these deserve to be planted more widely. *Fuchsia magellanica var. molinae 'Sharpitor'*, pictured below, or *Fuchsia magellanica var.gracilis 'Aurea'*.



Another surprise is that the fruits of the Fuchsia are edible. The blacker they are, the sweeter they become. Thompson and Morgan sell a variety called *F. 'Fuchsiaberry'* which has been bred specifically for the edible berries which are high in Vitamin C. They recommend using the ripe berries to add to muffins or brownies.

# **GARDENING FOLKLORE**

If it is warm enough on sit on the soil with no trousers on then it is warm enough to sow seeds directly in the ground.

Plant a single clove of garlic next to your roses to protect them from flying insects including aphids.

Pick blackberries before the end of September as, by October it is believed that the devil pees on the remaining fruit.

Plant chives in orchards to prevent lightning strikes.

Chilli plants will be spicier if you plant them when you are angry. Whilst, parsley and basil will grow better if you swear profusely as you plant them.

In 17<sup>th</sup> century England, brambles were considered magical. If you stepped under a thorny arch it could cure any ailment.

Planting by the phases of the moon:

In the moon's first phase plant vegetables that are grown for their aboveground crops, such as sweetcorn, spinach and lettuce.

In the second quarter, above-ground fruit crops should be planted, such as squashes and tomatoes.

The week after full moon is the time to plant below-ground crops, such as carrots and potatoes.

In the final quarter of the waning moon, planting should be avoided altogether and, instead, weeding should be the priority.
